RESOLUTION NO. 373

A RESOLUTION, approving project proposals as a participant in connection with the State Law and Justice Planning Office and approving County-wide goals and sub-goals recommended by the Law and Justice Planning Advisory Committee.

WHEREAS, the City of Redmond, together with other King County municipalities, is a participant in submitting grant applications through an interlocal agreement through the State Law and Justice Planning Office and has developed project proposals as a part of the 1976 Law and Justice Plan; and

WHEREAS, the Law and Justice Planning Advisory Committee, of which Redmond is a part, has developed County-wide goals and sub-goals for the 1976 King County Law and Justice Plan which are a required part of the planning process prescribed by State LJPO guidelines; and


WHEREAS, the City Council has reviewed the project proposals and the County-wide goals and sub-goals and has determined that they should be approved, Now, Therefore,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF REDMOND DO RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

1. Project proposal approved. The project proposal for the City of Redmond titled Juvenile Relations Officer (City of Redmond) and consisting of pages 131 through 133, copies of which are attached hereto and by reference incorporated herein, are hereby approved.
2. Approval of County-wide goals and sub-goals. The County-wide goals and sub-goals recommended by the Law and Justice Planning Advisory Committee for the 1976 King County Law and Justice Plan, captioned "King County Goals and Sub-Goals" which is attached hereto and adopted by this reference, are hereby approved.

a. Title: Juvenile Relations Officer (City of Redmond)

b. Summary: This is a continuation project first begun in July 1974. The project will provide for a fulltime juvenile relations position within the Redmond Police Department, with primary responsibility to develop/maintain liaison between the youth of the community (all school ages) and their police department. To accomplish this, the activities of the officer will include, but not be limited to the following:

1. Consultation with all juvenile offenders arrested by the Department.
2. Presentation of prepared programs such as Officer Bill series, "Youth and the Law," narcotics presentations, as well as maintaining a Police Explorer Post and continuing rap sessions during lunches at high school and junior high schools.
3. Meetings with Parent-Teacher Associations, community clubs, local service groups in an effort to secure parental support for the program.
4. Establish/maintain communication channels with various school administrators.
5. Continuation of the exchange of information with neighboring communities regarding youthful offender problems and disposition results.

c. Rationale: As can be noted in the problem description, below, the City of Redmond had reported a high, and greatly increased number, of burglaries in 1974. It appears that for this and other property crimes, juveniles are often the perpetrators. Because, prior to the project's initiation Redmond had no formal way of dealing with a growing youth population and a rising number of juvenile offenders, Redmond chose this strategy rather than another crime prevention or crime clearance strategy.

d. Problem: As in other suburban cities in King County the significant proportion of Part I offenses reported to the Redmond Police Department are those of burglary, larceny and auto theft. Arrests made for these offenses indicate that a great amount of this crime is committed by persons under 18 years of age.

e. Goals: Establish an effective, formal liaison between the youth of the community and their police department. Provide effective disposition of cases involving juvenile offenders so as to reduce the rate of recontact by police, particularly those involved in the property crime of burglary.

f. Objectives: These objectives are continued from the second project year, subject to revision if the evaluation so indicates:

1. Handle the disposition of all juveniles formally contacted by the Department, an estimated 175 for the 1976-77 project year.
2. Analyze each case handled to generate information on the effective disposition, that is, one which reduces further contact with the police.

g. Evaluation: Redmond anticipates conducting a Level C evaluation. Results from the first eight months of the first project period include:

1. Establishment of the juvenile relations officer position.
2. Setting up a Police Explorer Post.
3. Setting up a High School Traffic Court.
4. Processing the following cases of juvenile offenders:

KING COUNTY GOALS AND SUB-GOALS

RECOMMENDED FOR THE 1976 KING COUNTY LAW AND JUSTICE PLAN

GOAL 1: Reduce Burglary.

Subgoal 1: Reduce the rate of residential burglary to 12/1000 by 1978. (Estimated rate for King County excluding Seattle was 14/1000 in 1974.)

Subgoal 4: Reduce the rate of nonresidential burglary to 4/1000 by 1978. (Estimated rate for King County excluding Seattle was 5/1000 in 1974.)

GOAL 2: Increase the Fairness of the King County Criminal Justice System.

Subgoal 3: Increase availability and quality of information required for management and policy decisions affecting criminal justice operations.

Subgoal 6: Provide equal opportunity for participation in a County Work Release Program for all offenders who qualify under admission criteria.

Subgoal 7: Maintain the elapsed maximum time between filing cases/petitions and trials/fact finding hearings at 30 days for detained individual and 90 days for released individual in adult and juvenile courts.

GOAL 3: Increase Efficiency of the King County Criminal Justice System.

Subgoal 2: Increase productivity of criminal justice personnel.

Subgoal 3: Increase availability and quality of information required for management and policy decisions affecting criminal justice operations.

Subgoal 5: Maximize the utilization of existing capacity in criminal justice agencies' capital equipment and facilities.

Subgoal 7: Maintain the elapsed maximum time between filing cases/petitions and trials/fact finding hearings at 30 days for detained individual and 90 days for released individual in adult and juvenile courts.
